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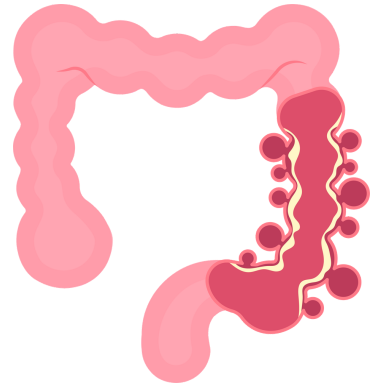
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Introduction: Hemorrhage of Anus And Rectum

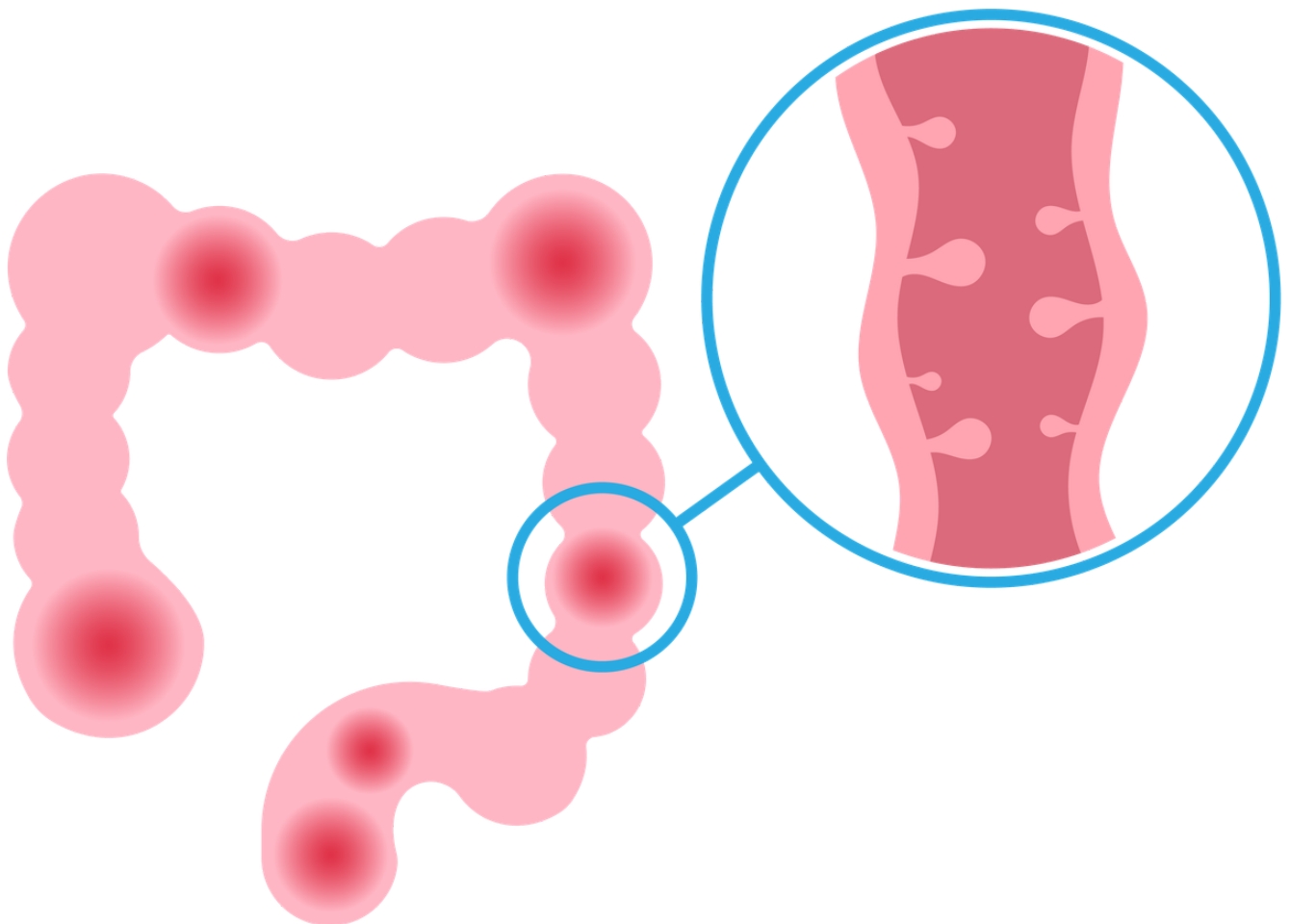

What Causes Hemorrhage of Anus And Rectum?

Known Causes:

The most common causes of rectal bleeding are hemorrhoids (swollen veins in the rectum or anus), anal fissures (small tears in the skin), and rectal ulcers. Other causes include diverticulosis, inflammatory bowel disease (IBD), colorectal cancer, and intestinal infections. 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Common Signs & Symptoms

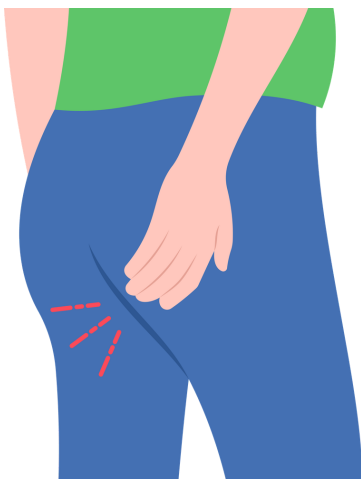

- Pain or discomfort during bowel movements
- Itching or irritation around the anus
- Swelling or a lump near the anus (in hemorrhoids)



Severe cases can also cause:



- Significant blood loss and anemia
- Severe pain or inability to pass stools
- Shock due to massive blood loss
- Rectal prolapse or tissue damage
- Persistent or recurrent bleeding requiring surgical intervention



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Diagnosis & Medical Testing

Diagnosis includes a physical examination, anoscopy, and possibly a colonoscopy or sigmoidoscopy to identify the source of bleeding. Blood tests may be done to assess anemia.

Diagnostic Tools:

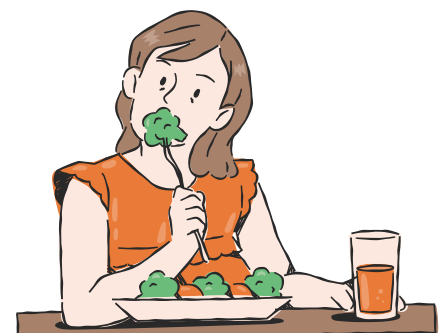
- **Physical exam** – Visual inspection of the anus and rectum
- **Anoscopy** – Direct visualization of the anus and rectum
- **Colonoscopy or sigmoidoscopy** – Check for internal causes (IBD, cancer, etc.)
- **Blood tests** – Assess for anemia from blood loss
- **Stool occult blood test** – Detect hidden blood in stool



A high-fiber diet helps prevent constipation, reducing strain during bowel movements. Adequate hydration and fiber-rich foods are essential for maintaining healthy bowel movements and preventing further bleeding.

- **Eat high-fiber foods (fruits, vegetables, whole grains)**
- **Stay hydrated with plenty of water**

Medications & Treatment Options

- **Laser therapy** – For large or persistent hemorrhoids



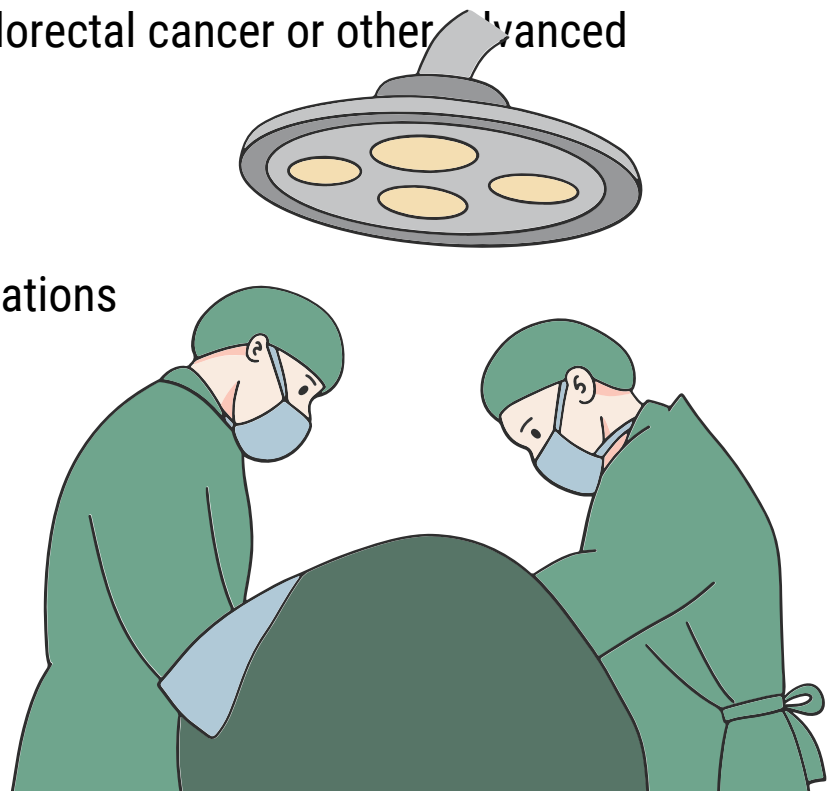
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Advanced Therapies & Procedures
