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Introduction: Flatulence

Flatulence, commonly known as passing gas or farting, is the natural release of intestinal gas through the rectum. It results from the digestion and fermentation of food by gut bacteria, swallowing air while eating or drinking, and chemical reactions in the digestive tract. What Causes Flatulence?

Known Causes:

Flatulence occurs when gas accumulates in the digestive tract and is expelled through the rectum. - Food Intolerances lactose, fructose, or gluten intolerance leading to increased fermentation.
- Gastrointestinal Disorders irritable bowel syndrome, celiac disease, infections, or malabsorption syndromes.
- Imbalance of Gut Bacteria overgrowth or altered gut microbiota can increase gas production.



Common Signs & Symptoms

Excessive passage of gas, bloating, abdominal discomfort or cramping, audible or smelly gas, feeling of fullness, and occasional urgency to pass gas. Symptoms may vary with diet, digestion, and underlying gastrointestinal conditions.

Core Symptoms Include:

- Excessive Gas frequent passing of intestinal gas.
- Bloating feeling of fullness or abdominal distension.
- Abdominal Discomfort cramping or mild pain in the stomach area.
- Audible Gas noticeable sounds when passing gas.

Severe cases can also cause:

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Diagnosis & Medical Testing
